TOWN BOARD MEETING April 12, 2023

7:00 PM

Supervisor Valentine opened the meeting at 7:00pm followed by a salute to the flag. Members present: Supervisor Valentine, Councilman Ardisana, Councilman Courtenay, Councilman Holdridge, Councilwoman Smith

Also present: Scott Bonacic, Esq., Town Attorney, Al Fusco, Fusco Engineering, Town Engineer

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Tom Becker, 163 Lehigh Ave., addressed the Board on the matter of the engineering RFP being prepared for the Walton Lake Estates well project. He asked if the Board would be utilizing the 60gpm well which would yield 86,400 gallons p/day along with the other low yielding wells that would bring the total to 54,100gallons over a 12-hour period, closer to the peak demand need of 67,000 gallons. He suggested keeping the sodium well on line. Engineer Fusco said we are concentrating on the 60gpm well, and that the well is high in magnesium and iron and will need treatment. Mr. Becker said that the grant can cover the associated expenses.

Joe Delaney, 22 Walnut Street addressed the Board on the matter of the pickle ball courts. He works from home, and said his property faces the courts and wanted to follow up on a letter he sent to the Town asking about the project scope and approvals. He asked if they considered noise reduction and location. He said other municipalities approach location selection considering the distance of 150ft.-350ft. with some type of noise mitigation. He asked if the bid included the leaning fences. Supervisor Valentine said he is looking into his concerns.

INTRODUCTORY LOCAL LAW NO. 2 OF 2023 - A LOCAL LAW TO UPDATE AND AMEND CHAPTER 33 OF THE TOWN CODE OF THE TOWN OF CHESTER TO PROHIBIT THE USE OF CANNABIS ON PUBLIC PROPERTY

ON A MOTION OFFERED BY Councilwoman Smith and second by Councilman Ardisana to introduce the following local law.

Be it enacted by the Town of Chester in the County of Orange, as follows:

Section 1. Purpose and Intent

It is the intent and purpose of this Local Law to update and amend Chapter 33 of the Town Code of the Town of Chester, entitled "Alcoholic Beverages", to add provisions which prohibit the use and consumption of cannabis on public property located in the Town of Chester. It is the finding of the Town Board of the Town of Chester that the use of cannabis by persons on public lands is detrimental to the health, safety and welfare of the residents of the Town of Chester in that such public use contributes to the creation of nuisances and otherwise impedes upon the welfare of Town residents. The Town of Chester enacts this local law an exercise of its police power to promote the general health, safety and welfare of the residents of the Town of Chester.

Section 2. Amend and Replace Chapter 33, Entitled, "Alcoholic Beverages", to Read:

Chapter 33. Alcoholic Beverages and Cannabis

Section 3. Amend and Replace §33-4, Entitled, "Exemptions", to Read:

§33-4. Penalties for Use.

A violation of this Article shall constitute an offense punishable by a fine not exceeding \$50 for each violation.

Section 4. Remove §33-5, Entitled, "Penalties for Use", in Entirety.

Section 5. Add Article II, to Read:

Article II. Use of Cannabis on Public Property.

§33-5. Legislative Findings.

The Town Board of the Town of Chester finds that the use of cannabis on public property owned by the Town of Chester is detrimental to the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of the Town of Chester, causes unsightly and unsanitary conditions and creates a public nuisance.

§33-6. Definitions.

CANNABIS

As used in this Article, the definitions of "Cannabis," "Cannabis Products," and "Cannabis-Infused Products," shall have the meanings as defined in the New York State Marijuana Regulation and Taxation Act.

PUBLIC PROPERTY

As used in this Article, Public Property shall mean any highway, street, sidewalk, park, playground, municipal-owned building or public parking lot.

§33-7. Prohibited Acts.

- A. No person shall use, smoke, ingest or consume any Cannabis, Cannabis Products or Cannabis-Infused Products on any Public Property within the Town of Chester.
- B. No person shall sell, transfer, purchase or obtain any Cannabis, Cannabis Products or Cannabis-Infused Products on any Public Property within the Town of Chester.

§33-8. Presumption of Use.

It shall be presumed that any person who openly possesses any unpackaged Cannabis, Cannabis Products or Cannabis-Infused Products while on Public Property is using said products.

§33-9. Penalties for Offenses.

Each violation of this Article shall constitute an offense punishable by a civil penalty of up to \$200, at the discretion of the Town of Chester Justice Court.

Section 6. Severability.

If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, or part of this Local Law or the application thereof to any person, firm or corporation, or circumstance, shall be adjusted by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, or part of this Local Law or in its application to the person, individual, firm or corporation or circumstance, directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment or order shall be rendered.

Section 7. Effective date.

This local law shall take effect immediately upon filing with the Secretary of State.

Water Department – March 2023

The water department processed and distributed 7,055,482 gallons of water for the month of March. The districts daily average ranged from 349 gallons to 89,000 gallons. The monthly breakdown is:

Lake Hill Farms- 2,748,000 gal. Sugar Loaf- 1,647,600 gal. Surrey Meadows-1,394,400 gal. Walton Lake Estates- 1,090,000 gal. Fieldcrest- 164,554 gal. (Distribution only) Town Hall- 10,828 gal.

Distribution sampling by us as well as random sampling by Orange County DOH showed adequate disinfection levels and tested negative for any signs of bacteria.

Monthly DOH 360 forms and test results for February were submitted on 3/10/23.

Laboratory testing dates were the 1st and the 15th.

Bi-Annual meter reading conducted at all districts from the 9th through the 21st.

Meter repairs, re-reads, and replacements ran through the 28st.

Connor McPhee was hired as a laborer on the 13th.

Chemicals delivered at Walton Lake on the 27th.

Brakes were replaced on the Blue Chevy truck on the 24th.

Annual Water quality reports were sent to Clerks office on the 28th.

Walton Lake Estates was quiet with routine operations and maintenance. Met with Al Fusco Engineering to go over new well pump house location down by the new cell tower on the 27th.

COMMUNITY POLICING

During the month, Town of Chester police officers assisted members of the community in many ways. Some of the community policing activity is listed below.

Officers completed 5 house security checks and 1256 business security checks.

There were three child passenger safety seat checks completed in March. Sergeant Dugan and Officers Bird, Weinstein, Stack and Narain continue to remain available for child passenger safety seat checks and installations. An all-inclusive (special needs) Child Passenger Safety Seat Check is being planned in Sugar Loaf on May 241".

Officer Santosky-Wright remained in contact with the Sugar Loaf community groups and businesses.

Officer Dunlop remained in contact with the Bruderhof Community.

SRO Perez and SSOs Deluca and Donato attended a Parent Advisory Panel meeting at the Chester Elementary School on March 29th.

TRAINING

Officer Dunlop and K-9 Lou began the sixteen-week K-9 Patrol School on March 13th with instructors from the Orange County Sheriff's Office.

Monthly training for March was Response to the Active Shooter training at the Sugar Loaf Performing Arts Center. It was scheduled for March 14th and canceled due to a winter storm.

MISCELLANEOUS

On March 8th, we were notified of a post made on the social media platform Snapchat indicating that there may be a bomb in the Chester Academy. Multiple other agencies responded to the school to assist us with the investigation. We assisted the school district with a hold-in-place followed by a controlled early dismissal. Multiple Explosives Detection K9 units were then deployed in the school with no explosives detected. The investigation is ongoing.

Commercial vehicle enforcement details were held on March 3" and 17th with the NYS Department of Transportation. Ten vehicles were inspected and five unsafe vehicles were taken out of service with major violations.

TRU team members assisted the Village of Goshen PD during the annual Mid-Hudson St. Patrick's Day parade on March 12th.

Chief Doellinger and Administrative Sergeant Vitale attended a presentation by the FBI on March 281" in Goshen. Multiple presenters discussed the resources that they have available to assist us in many different ways.

We continued to assign police officers to the Chester Academy and Chester Elementary School during the school day in March.

Part-time Police Officer Nicholas Contino continued his field training in March.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Supervisor Valentine read the correspondence from Lydia Cuadros announcing the eligibility for Sugar Loaf for listing on the State and National Registers. This will allow us to proceed with the Preserve NY Grant application and potential designation as a historic district.

TOWN BOARD COMMENTS

Councilman Ardisana said he is glad to see the eligibility of Sugar Loaf as a historic district and hopes to see it be designated as such this year.

Councilman Courtenay reported that Assemblyman Maher has informed him that Route 17M will be cleaned up by DOT on the 21st and the State Police have issued fines to violating haulers. He announced the Chester Little League ribbon cutting on Saturday. He will confirm the start time.

Councilwoman Smith said seed has been planted at the dog park and the parking lot has been completed. She will be looking at the layout for tree plantings and no parking signs along Pond Road. She added that the work is in progress on the pickle ball court. The layout will be complete in two weeks, then the permanent nets can be installed. She congratulated the Chester Mock Trial for advancing to the final 4. She announced the closure of Johnson Farm and the Kiwanis Clean Up on May 13, with rain date of May 20th or 21st.

Councilman Holdridge said the Community Day at the Chester Commons Park has been postponed, due to discussions needed as to how to best proceed following this event. He sent the dog park rules to the Town Board. It was agreed that up to 2 dogs be allowed for each person and children under 16 years old be accompanied by a guardian.

SPEED STUDY RESOLUTION

Councilman Holdridge asked the Board to consider requesting a speed study request for the stretch of 94 from the Village line to the Blooming Grove line.

ON A MOTION OFFERED BY Councilman Holdridge and second by Supervisor Valentine to request the Department of Transportation conduct a speed study along State Route 94 from the Village of Chester/Town of Chester line to the Town of Chester/Blooming Grove line.

VOTE: AYES (5): Valentine, Ardisana, Courtenay, Holdridge, Smith ADOPTED

Councilman Holdridge advised the Board that since they bills presented to the Governor were not signed into law, there are now bills in the Assembly and Senate regarding the creation of a study to eliminate the double tax issue for the residents that are affected within the Town of Chester and Warwick School District. He will help write the language for a resolution in support. Councilman Holdridge asked the status of the Senior Tax Exemption. Supervisor Valentine said that the Assessor couldn't provide a town-wide comparison, but a single tax parcel could be looked at. He said there will be a lot of ratables coming on line such as the Greens of Chester which should make a huge offset so that the exemptions won't be harmful to the budget.

Supervisor Valentine provided an update on the sprinkler system for the Commons. The Mayor has informed him that the Board consensus was that they were not interested in providing water for various reasons, however the conversation will continue with the Town providing flows and estimates. The well at the Highway Garage may be used for the sprinkler system at 10gpm but is high in salt so it is not a promising solution. The proposition to the school district may alleviate the pressure on the Town and he said would be a win-win. The Supervisor thanked Highway Superintendent Reilly and the Highway and Parks Department for their help with the dog park. He thanked Richard Logothetis for his design and benches. He commented that the Sugar Loaf Mountain project that will be in front of the Planning Board next Wednesday for approvals will be a great thing for Chester. He thanked Al Fusco for donating his services.

ADJOURNMENT

ON A MOTION OFFERED BY Councilwoman Smith and second by Councilman Courtenay to adjourn the meeting at 8:20pm, there being no further business brought before the Board. Motion carried 5-0.
