SUMMARY OF BILLS

Discussion: Supervisor Holdridge explained the utility abstract also includes the return of a road bond. Council Member Dysinger requested the report be provided a day or two earlier for review.

REPORTS

Supervisor Holdridge provided the following updates:

The Dog Park has had turf installed in the vestibule that had been muddy and “No Pet” signs were recently installed at the various other parks in Town.

He and Council Member Courtenay attended a planning meeting for the 2025 Summer Camp program with hopes it will happen and be budgeted for, with Board support. There will be trips and other events planned for this year.

He attended Finance School along with Comptroller Meyer which he opined was helpful in areas such as budgeting and long-term planning.

Supervisor Holdridge met with Engineer Queenan to discuss plans for the playground inclusive of sensory disabilities and all types of needs for children which expands on the CDBG Grant of \$170,000 with paving around the fields at Carpenter, which he is very hopeful will be funded.

He noted the response from the DOT denying the speed limit reduction on Kings Highway. He will work on a request to reduce the 40MPH speed limit on the back end of Kings Highway to 30MPH.

Supervisor Holdridge noted the response from DOT concerning the request to bring the 17M Bridge construction timeline up, without any firm commitment, but remains hawkish in his quest to keep the roadway in good repair. He has forwarded our requests to the State Senate and Assembly. The project is set to go to bid late 2025 with construction to start late 2026/early 2027.

He announced the clothes and toiletries collection at his and Senator’s Skoufis Cornwall office this Friday for four of the six families involved in the Whispering Hills fire that are in need.

Supervisor Holdridge added the Kiwanis Clean-up was a great success and he thanked the Kiwanians and everyone involved.

Council Member Dysinger said he is still waiting on feedback on the filling of land from the Town Board, Planning Board, Engineer and Building Inspector. He completed a draft to replace code 95A which needs enhancement to cover property maintenance along with weed control. He said this is in an effort to increase property values with maintained landscaping. The draft has been sent to the Town Board and Comprehensive Plan Committee. He commented on the submitted changes to the AR3 zoning from the committee which the Attorney will provide a draft local law amendment. SR1, 2 and 6 will be dealt with in the coming months.

Council Member Becker provided his report:

For the theater the water department installed the chlorination system. I am reviewing the material specifications for the water line to be installed there. An estimate of costs for the project are \$5,000 for wet tap, \$50,000 plus for water main materials with additional costs for bedding plus fill around the water line.

Last week I attended the Moodna Basin meeting. We will be looking at a lot of future costs for infrastructure upgrades:

\$50,000 for the repair of the Sugarloaf force main repair done two weeks ago.

\$70,000 for the upgrades made to pump station 3A.

Also, the future costs to us from the County for the planned upgrades to the Harriman treatment plant.

We also need to keep in mind that some of our district’s flow through the Village and we may be adding maintenance and pumping costs to those districts. The Surrey Meadows sewer district is in desperate need of infrastructure repairs to fix infiltration issues.

After our engineer finalizes the plans for the water main at the theater would the board be in agreement to have them start work on the plans for tying in the new well at Walton Lake Estates?

Council Member Courtenay said he is finalizing the committee members for the SLPAC and will have it ready for the work session along with a tentative policy and procedures. He attended meetings with the Supervisor and participated in the Kiwanis Clean-up. He plans on assisting at the Kiwanis 5K this Saturday.

Council Member Ardisana warned with Memorial Day there is drinking and driving. He announced the Touch-A-Truck on June 15th. He reported that neighbors took down trees and there is now a lot of wood in their driveway. Council Member Dysinger said that regulation needs to be reflected in the code. Council Member Ardisana shall talk with the Building Inspector about code changes.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Cindy Smith, Greycourt Rd., asked if the matter concerning Camp LaGuardia had been looked into. Supervisor Holdridge said he received a reply from County Executive Neuhaus that they have been cleaning up the property for the last two years with intent to turn it into a park. Ms. Smith asked the status of the dead trees at the Dog Park. Supervisor Holdridge said they are trying to save the two and replace the one dead with the help of Richard Logothetis. It is believed the purchase from Jansen had a one-year warranty and the trees have been watered.

Richard Logothetis gave a recap of the work done at Margolis Gateway Park. He said the work with the Town, Committee, Girl Scouts and donations got it done and he is proud of it. He is looking forward to the future projects including traffic calming, sidewalks and a Town Square. He said we need a survey map and a three-foot walk is ADA compliant.

Jeff Zahn provided the following written comments:

WHAT DOES SUGAR LOAF MEAN TO CHESTER - and why it deserves an investment in our future?

For me - it's all about heart – on RT 17 there is a billboard that says Welcome to Chester - the Heart of Orange County.

And many of us feel Sugar Loaf is the heart of Chester - not MacDonald's or the Castle, Allan's Falafel - or the industrial park – all wonderful but not quite the heart.

Sugar Loaf is quirky and different - and attracts visitors, shoppers and concert goers from all over. It has restaurants, shops, breweries and very successful special events like the Fall, Spring and Holiday Festivals.

And I think it's clear that recently Sugar Loaf is going thru a mini renaissance with so many wonderful things happening. New businesses are opening. The caboose has been renovated. Margolis Park rebuilt. The mountain purchased. We're becoming a historic district. The SLPAC doing so well. The road turned over to the Town. Our festivals continue to thrive. And lots of other great things happening.

Many of our neighboring towns have some type of draw or identity. Warwick has its thriving downtown. Goshen has the track, the museum and the Heritage Trail. For Chester - it's really Sugar Loaf. It's Pete's Candles, The Tap House, Rosner Soap, Mary Endico, Cachet, Nick Zungoli's gallery, and more .

Many of the issues being discussed have been identified for decades going back to a SUNY Albany study that says sidewalks and traffic calming are absolutely essential to our growth. We never had the opportunity to enact any of these changes till this year when the Town finally took over the road.

So the question becomes - growth or not? We clearly need these changes in order to grow - or at the least maintain what we have. The shop keepers need it as well as the visitors and residents. It's not just aesthetics and making the town pretty. It's also about safety and crossing the street without ducking fast moving trucks and have ample parking for our visitors and residents.

And we can't move ahead with any meaningful changes unless we can approve budgeting this survey as a first step. We are

very appreciative that the town is seriously considering investing in our future. And we understand the board has lots of other worthwhile initiatives it needs to fund.

So it's important to point out - that we do not take this for granted! We do have "skin in the game" and are totally committed to putting even more skin in the game!

Today, three members of the SLCF spent hours in the hot sun planting flowers throughout the town which we paid for. Last week, three other SLCF members finished rebuilding Margolis Park. The town generously paid for the signs but we all invested our own money and "sweat equity" to rebuild it. I produce free classical and kids' concerts for the town in which I always lose money. And Richard and Susan Logothetis put on an incredible free series for the SL, investing their money and time. In addition, we're currently making plans for a fall 5K race with the proceeds targeted for town improvements.

We take pride in our community, willingly invest in it, put our 'heart' into it - and want to see it succeed.

It's important to point out that we if the survey is approved and we start moving ahead - nothing will be done without public meetings and public discussions. We have aggregated ideas from professionals - but want to work with the town board, residents and business owners to make sure we make the smartest and most cost-effective decisions.

As an example, numerous studies have suggested raised crosswalks are effective measures in slowing down traffic. But many residents and shop owners are skeptical - so we're now looking into alternative suggestions – such as regular, not raised crosswalks. Or having solar speeding light signs. We want to work with everyone in a cooperative, transparent manner – including the town board -with the shared goal of having as little impact on the taxpayers as possible.

We're very appreciative the board is looking into funding the survey as we feel it is a critically important first step. And we'll do our part to support you in every way possible. It is all about heart – and we hope you share our desire to make Sugar Loaf even more special. Thanks for your consideration.

Nick Zungoli provided the following comments:

I am so excited over the progress that's been made this past year. Aside from the purchase of Sugar Loaf Mountain with your help, I want to thank the Town Board for the support you've given Sugar Loaf starting with acquiring Kings Highway from the County. This was a major step toward making the hamlet a safe and more attractive place to live, work and visit. Now the real work will begin of improving the road to help slow the speed and volume of traffic. Before any plan can be put into place, an engineering survey will need to be done. As you know, the businesses and residents of Sugar Loaf put a plan together twenty years ago. Please let's not wait any longer to address the traffic issues that plague the hamlet. Now that the Town owns Kings Highway, it's more imperative than ever to make it safe.

I'd also like to thank the Town Board for your help in completing the newly finished Margolis Gateway project. The Community Foundation paid for the landscape plan, community members designed and built the new posts, the Town purchased two beautiful carved signs, a girl scout completed an eagle badge project and rebuilt the stone wall with community help, and this past week community members finished the gateway with new topsoil, plantings and mulch. The project shows how much can be accomplished when the community and Town all work together.

Currently our community foundation is organizing several fundraisers to help with the cost of the improvements that are coming to the hamlet. This summer we'll be sponsoring concerts and a 5k road race to help in the Town's effort. Together the community and Town can begin the process of improving the business district by approving funds for the Sugar Loaf survey. Please let's make it happen! Thank you.

Connie Roach, FB, asked why we need permission on the Town Road to reduce the speed limit. Supervisor Holdridge explained the State has oversight on the speed of all roads. Council Member Becker stated that the addition of stop signs may deter people to using the Bypass.

Lydia Cuadros, FB, asked which water district would receive the \$130,000 grant. Council Member Becker explained it has been earmarked for the Walton Estates Water District project for materials to run the pipeline from the well to the plant.

RESOLUTION TO EARMARK \$125,450 IN ARPA FUNDING TO ACQUIRE AND INSTALL A GENERATOR FOR THE SENIOR CENTER.

ON A MOTION OFFERED BY Supervisor Holdridge and second by Council Member Courtenay to approve the earmark \$125,450 in ARPA funding to acquire and install a generator for the Senior Center as an Emergency Shelter and Warming and Cooling Center.

Discussion: Supervisor Holdridge explained that after so many emergencies with the bomb threat and fires, there is a need for back-up power at the Senior Center. He added although it is being allocated, the full amount may not be spent and can be reallocated up until April 2025. Council Member Courtenay commented that he had been talking about this need for the past five years. He said it is imperative to do this since the fire houses cannot be used as shelters and thought the Senior Center may have been built to have a plug-in generator. He also voiced concern about needing a larger building in the future. Council Member Dysinger said that if used as a real emergency shelter, the Town should allocate funds for cots in the future. Mr. Logothetis commented that the pad at the theater is capable of holding a larger generator, for future location consideration, which could cut demand by switching over to it and saving money.

RESOLUTION TO ACCEPT BUILDING MORATORIUM WAIVER REQUEST – 306 BLACK MEADOW ROAD AND REFERRAL TO PLANNING BOARD

WHEREAS, the Town of Chester has commenced a comprehensive planning process and in furtherance of that process, has adopted Local Law 1 of 2024, a moratorium on certain permits, certificates of occupancy and approvals for certain development; and

WHEREAS, Nicole Marie Socci, owner of 306 Black Meadow Road have previous applied for and received approval to construct a barn on said premises; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary to bring in approximately 1000 yards of fill to achieve said construction; and

WHEREAS, said fill requires site plan approval; and

WHEREAS, the Planning Board will not accept a site plan application due to the pending building moratorium; and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that upon review of the various materials submitted to the Town Board, the Town Board finds that the proposed project should be considered exempt from the moratorium pursuant to Section 3, E (7) as the proposed project is for the purpose of completing a previously approved barn and will not alter the approved or legal use of the property or structure; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this determination is subject to site plan review and approval by the Town of Chester Planning Board; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Planning Board shall accept and process the site plan application in accordance with the Town of Chester’s zoning code.

RESOLUTION TO EARMARK \$100,000 IN ARPA FUNDING FOR THE DEVELOPMENT AND EXECUTION OF THE COMPREHENSIVE PLAN

ON A MOTION OFFERED BY Supervisor Holdridge and second by Council Member Courtenay to approve the earmark of \$100,000 in ARPA funding for the development and execution of the Comprehensive Plan and survey of Kings Highway.

Discussion: Supervisor Holdridge explained that Lanc & Tully would be doing the review for the Comprehensive Plan of which \$40,000 would be earmarked for this expense and project scope, which may be exceeded. \$25,000 is to be allocated for a survey for the Sugar Loaf hamlet to lay the groundwork for the sidewalk, crosswalks and pedestrian friendly improvements project,

fulfilling the goal from the previous comp plan. A search can then start for grants and funding. There have been many meetings held and people are hyped to see how to shape it and, with the engineer, it will get done. It is the intention to fund the first part of the project to make something big of our hamlet. Council Member Becker raised concern about the use of ARPA funds, as it was to be used to cover most of the Town, with other projects needed such as the road rebuild to well on Town-owned property near the school as well as the water line to Sugar Loaf which will benefit the entire Town. He voiced concern over the Town's financial issues and asked whether the survey would go out to bid. Council Member Dysinger shared the concerns but understood the money is to be earmarked, but not yet spent. Supervisor Holdridge said there is \$73,000 left over for the SLPAC and other uses. Council Member Courtenay added that he too shares concern over the financials but it is a double-edged sword and to get this done, obviously, is a priority because then we can see if we could finally get serious about getting some funding. He stated we talked about a date when we should have a number and asked to hold everyone's feet to the fire on that drop-dead date because there's a lot of things we have to do. Supervisor Holdridge said he agrees and the Comptroller is expected to have the finances in order by the end of June and the budget process is to begin in July.

A draft tax district map has been prepared and will be reviewed for later adoption. He read the notice to be published and posted to the Town's website along with the RFP.

RESOLUTION TO ACCEPT THE BUILDING MORATORIUM WAIVER REQUEST – 1597 Route 17M

WHEREAS, the Town of Chester has commenced a comprehensive planning process and in furtherance of that process, has adopted Local Law 1 of 2024, a moratorium on certain permits, certificates of occupancy and approvals for certain development; and

WHEREAS, M’Lanie Hunter previously submitted an application to the Town of Chester Planning Board for the construction of a 25,000 square foot dance studio and day care facility and reconstruction of an existing barn located on site in 2022. The project is located on a 5.3-acre lot within the LB zoning district; and

WHEREAS, the applicant was navigating the planning process including review pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act; and

WHEREAS, the adoption of Local Law 1 of 2024 has prevented the project from continuing its planning board review; and

WHEREAS, the applicant has submitted a request for a waiver pursuant to Local Law 1 of 2024 and has provided documentation as to the financial hardship that would result I the absence of a waiver by the Town Board. Said documentation includes the cost of project engineering, a Small Business Administration Loan which will shortly come into repayment, and the cost of on-going rent of the applicant’s existing dance studio that will continue to accrue with the delay of the project; and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that after considering the materials presented, together with the report of the Planning Board, the Town Board hereby grants a waiver pursuant Section 4 of Local Law 1 of 2024; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Planning Board is hereby authorized to process the applicant’s site plan application in accordance with the Town of Chester Zoning Code.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the applicant is on notice that the applicable zoning may change as a result of the comprehensive planning process and that the applicant is proceeding at their own risk. This waiver does not act to grandfather the existing project under the current zoning.
